

ALF ENGEN

Born in Norway; his first skis were home-made and used melted phonograph records for wax.

- 1929 Arrived in the US
- 1931 World ski jumping record-setter twice in one day; US Ski Jumping Champion
- 1932, 33, 34 US Ski Jumping Champion
- 1937 US Ski Jumping Champion; Canadian and North American Ski Jumping Champion
- 1939-41 National Jumping and Cross-country Combined Champion
- 1940-41 National Four-way Champion (jumping, cross-country, downhill, slalom); US Ski Jumping Champion
- 1941, 1942, 1947 National Downhill and Slalom Champion
- 1946 US Ski Jumping Champion
- 1948 Coach of US Olympic Ski Team
- 1956 National Ski Hall of Fame
- 1989 Professional Ski Instructors of America/Intermountain Hall of Fame
- 1948-1989 Director, Alf Engen Ski School, Alta, UT

Father of the powder skiing technique; Namesake for one of America's 10 most famous ski runs, Alf's High Rustler at Alta, UT
