WOMEN SPEED SKATE AT OLYMPICS Barbara Marchetti was THE tour de force in women's speed skating in the mid 1950s. However, women's speed skating did not become an olympic event until 1960 and Barbara never got to be a participant.

We, of Barbara's era, have memories of her doing "laps" around the perimeter of the skating rink and striving to keep up with her—in vain. In the summer she turned into a runner and would drag heavy loads to build her strength— much like the horse-pulling competition at the fair. To us of that time, whenever we watch the the Olympics, we wonder, "What would have happened if Barbara had been there in 1960?"

The current generation knows next to nothing about one of Norway's "favorite daughter's" exploits.


The Facts

Barbara Marchetti DeSchepper, born in 1930, by 1955 had distinguished herself as the 12 times National and North American Outdoor and Indoor Women's Speedskating Champion in the Senior Class. She set 5 National Indoor records. She was elected May 15, 1976 to the National Speed Skating Museum & Hall of Fame.

Over 50 years after her retirement from the sport in 1955, Michigan finally recognized her feats by naming her to the Michigan Sports Hall of Fame in March of 2012.
